RECALL A FEELING OF INCLUSION + BELONGING



LANGUAGE IS LARGELY CULTURAL, AN EXPRESSION OF POWER

Social systems of domination (patriarchy, colonization, racialization, segregation, etc.) are what create othering and exclusion.

Culture shapes our use of language



In systems of domination, these values are shaped by the dominant group(s), and they are communicated through story and language.

WAYS OF KNOWING, LEARNING + SHARING

In our culture, written language is paramount, and other forms of communication are often undervalued or erased.

BEHAVIORAL NORMS (BELONGING)

The ways language is used, and what is considered acceptable. (Consider issues of ableism, literacy, code-switching, etc.)

ACCESS (INCLUSION)

These things work together to shape access to resources of all kinds.

FOR EXAMPLES...





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97% of the world's population speaks 4% of its languages. UNESCO believes half of the world's languages will be extinct by 2100.

"HUMAN"/ "PERSON"

American (written) laws have shaped personhood, from transatlantic enslavement to Citizens United.



"QUEER"

Transformed from a derogatory slur into a word meant to convey pride and solidarity.


If "content is king", then context is land.



CONTEXT IN UX

UX writing (and more) creates belonging.





(REALLY) CLEAR

Clarity often requires that writers be <u>descriptive</u>. Partial pictures leave people guessing and/or dominant norms unquestioned.

UX WRITERS CREATE SHARED REALITIES



CONCISE PRECISE

Precision inspires us to keep language accessible and <u>actionable</u>. Alternatively, distraction and/or deception create disconnection.



USEFUL COMPASSIONATE

There's a difference between saying you care and acting as if people matter. Create belonging by being <u>adaptive</u> to needs.





PRACTICES

Where to start and examples.

BE CLEAR AND DESCRIPTIVE

EMBRACE COMPLEXITY

Complexity is not "bad", it's real. Instead of simple or vague, strive for honest and thoughtful.






BE MULTI-MODAL

Writing along cannot create context or belonging. Accompany with visuals, audio, etc.

ATTEND TO STORY


Stories/framing influences understanding. What attitudes/beliefs does your writing support/imply?



"We can write a story where we all belong. Sometimes, people say, 'We have to create a space where we are interconnected.' I say, 'actually we don't; we have to create an awareness.' The interconnection is already there."

CLEAR AND DESCRIPTIVE

BE PRECISE AND ACTIONABLE



TRANSPARENCY

Explain <u>fully</u>. Avoid euphemisms. "Own" system errors. Admit unknowns.

....


PLAIN LANGUAGE

Know what is considered plain to your users. They should be able to understand your writing the first time they read or hear it, and be able to use it to meet their needs.



This includes terms and conditions!





PRECISE AND ACTIONABLE

(See tosdr.org to read TOS in plain language)



BE COMPASSIONATE AND ADAPTIVE BY LISTENING!

Honoring context is about acknowledging that language is inherently living and emergent.





COMPASSIONATE AND ADAPTIVE

Honoring context isn't about following dos/don'ts.

It isn't about merely doing methods.

It's about practicing being consistently conscientious.
